The Great Depression in Canada

1929

- North American stock market crashes
- Glut of wheat on the market causes wheat prices to fail
- World market prices for all grains and other products decline

1930

- Rain stops. Drought begins
- Poor crop growing conditions escalate weed and insect infestations which exacerbate the poor crop growth
- R.B. Bennett's Conservatives win the federal election
- Control over Manitoba's natural resources is transferred from the federal government to the provincial government
- The U.S Smoot-Hawley Tariff protects U.S. domestic agriculture and restricts Canadian agriculture exports

1931

- A dust storm deposits 6000 tons of silt on the city of Winnipeg
- Many prairie farmers experience a 50% drop in income levels
- In Winnipeg, the business community starts to experience a down turn

1932

- Federal government establishes relief camps for transient men
- Thousands of Manitobans lose their jobs. May flee to Winnipeg to seek relief.
- Winnipeg's per capita unemployment rises to Canada's second highest
- Hoboes ride the rails in search of work and the federal government, uncomfortable with photos of vagrant men on the trains, tries to ban the practice. When th RCMP pulls the men off the train, depositing them in towns and villages across the country, the outcry is so loud

that the government relents and unofficially allows the practice to continue

1933

 Manitoba doctors' fees drop by 50% and were frequently paid in chickens and firewood. They decide to strike for a setting of minimum fees for sick people on city relief.

1935

- Canadian government creates the new Canadian Wheat Board
- R.B. Bennett announces "New Deal" (new national economic reforms)
- Mackenzie King wins election from Bennett
- Bank of Canada established

1936

• Canadians struggle to survive and many learn to appreciate even the simplest things in life: shelter, food, clothing

1937

- Auto workers strike in Oshawa
- Simmering racism and prejudice against natives and 'foreigners' are a product of the bitterness and resentfulness of some unemployed
- Judicial Committee of the Privy Council finds several Bennett "New Deal" measures to be unconstitutional

1939

- By the end of the dirty thirties, more than half of Manitobans have received some sort of government assistance
- Canada declares war on Germany; Britain and France declare war on Germany; as the Great Depression ends, WWII begins
