## Nouns

Nouns that are specific help build strong sentences.

"Without her boots, Mildred had lost some steam.

Her socks were more hole than cotton."

"She took good long whiffs of the wonderful essence of detergent and clean Dacron-cotton which floated down with the petticoat."

"It was a calm, cloudless night, and a pale sliver of moon peeked over the rooftops. Insects as thick as confetti swirled around the cowls of the streetlights."

"Four of the nine Supreme Court justices issued a bitter dissent."

## A noun names a person, place, thing, or idea.

- Common nouns refer to a general person, place, thing, or idea. (boots/detergent)
- A Proper nouns refer to a specific person, place, thing, or idea. These nouns are always capitalized. (like Mildred/Supreme Court)
- Nouns can be singular or plural. (petticoat/whiffs)
